#### Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and was formed on 30 December 2010. It is governed by articles of association as amended 20 July 2011 and 15 May 2015. The liability of the members in the event of the company being wound up is limited to a sum not exceeding £1.Trustees usually meet each month throughout the year. The majority of the meetings make use of video conferencing software reflecting the wide geographic spread of the trustees.

#### Method of recruitment and appointment of trustees

The trustees of the charity are also the directors for the purposes of company law and are appointed by the members at the AGM.

## **Objectives and activities**

## The charity's objects

To preserve and protect the health and to advance the education and development of children and adults who have communication difficulties and people important to them (family / carers / supporters), particularly by assisting or encouraging people using alternative and augmentative communication (AAC) within the United Kingdom to achieve their communication potential, and to make provisions or promote any scheme thought necessary to meet this aim.

To advance the education of the public, to increase their awareness and understanding of AAC.

## The charity's main activities

1 Voice creates opportunities to bring together children and adults who use augmentative and alternative communication (AAC) and people important to them (family / carers / supporters) to share ideas, information, skills and personal experiences.

1Voice holds residential event(s) each year and local activities throughout the year supported by regional committees.

1 Voice further aims to reach out to the wider public to increase awareness through published newsletters and internet based presence such as website and social media platforms.

## Public benefit statement

In setting our objectives and planning our activities our Trustees have given serious consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit and in particular the relief of disability such as working with families and children with complex needs and speech impairments.

## Achievements and performance

1Voice has had another successful year. Our membership continues to rise and we have over 500 members. There is a good mix of AAC users, families and professionals interested in our support services.

## National Residential Weekend – Shropshire – The Sound of 1 Voice

The event was held at Derwen College, Shropshire 28-30 July and was attended by 67 people in total, benefitting 14 AAC users and their families. Thanks to funding from Jessie's Fund, a group of musicians ran a music workshop with our young people. For parents, informative sessions were provided about AAC and literacy and there was an opportunity to learn more about Communication Matters. 1Voice received very positive feedback from the event.

## <u>1Voice 1Day 2017 – Leeds</u>

1Voice 1Day was again held at Communication Matters Conference in Leeds in September. Our young AAC users were invited to join in on a journey around the world, creating their dream passports and taking part in Lego building activities. Again we worked well with Communication Matters and we appreciate these opportunities to collaborate closely, to the mutual benefit of both organisations. Our members and trustees again presented papers at this prestigious AAC conference.

## Branches and Local Events

Three of our branches were active during the fiscal year, holding nine events. 1Voice Lakes & Bay, our oldest branch, continues to go from strength to strength holding a regular programme of activities. During the year, the branch visited an ice-cream parlour and a car museum, took a boat trip on Lake Windermere, held an outdoor activity weekend at The Bendrigg Trust and held their Christmas party. 1Voice Lancs visited the Space Sensory Centre and enjoyed a bowling trip. 1Voice South East held three events during the year. They met in June to join in adventures in Wonderland, in November to explore their 'light and dark' sides and tried their hand at shadow puppets and sand tray animation, and in March enjoyed African inspired arts and crafts and storytelling followed by an African drumming session. January saw the launch of 1Voice East of England with attendees enjoying an inclusive dance workshop at the first event.

## Trustees' report (continued) for the year ended 31 March 2018

#### Achievements and performance continued

Pop-ups: Where we do not have an organised branch, we try to engage the public in pop-ups. During the fiscal year we met in Kent, Warrington and West Yorkshire. These local/ branch level events, help us to reach out to the general public to educate them on augmentative and alternative communication. 1Voice has also provided networking and peer to peer support via email and continues to use social media to raise awareness of our activities.

#### Newsletter

We published two newsletters in the year, in June and October. The October newsletter was published to coincide with AAC Awareness month. These newsletters are initially emailed to members and then shared via social media. We also send hard copies to AAC Assessment Hubs to inform them of our activities and ask them to share them with their caseload where possible. The publication of the newsletter is one of the ways in which we achieve our "education" to the public on awareness of AAC, as well as keeping our members up-to-date with relevant new developments and members own stories. We also share information on our fundraising activities to encourage our members and their family, friends and colleagues to consider raising funds for us.

#### Representation at Events

1Voice attended several functions, again to meet our objectives of promoting wider public understanding of AAC. Throughout the year, 1 Voice representatives attended a number of Communication Matters roadshows. A presentation was made at the Communication Matters' annual conference in September.

1Voice is a member of the Communication Trust, a coalition of over 50 non-profit entities that support speech. language and communication needs (SLCN) of the general population. We have a representative at the Communication Trust consortium meetings. This representative is also a trustee of Communication Matters, the UK Chapter of ISAAC (International Society of Augmentative and Alternative Communication), a world-wide organisation promoting the best possible communication for people with complex communication needs. This has strengthened the link between our two organisations and we highly value the collaboration with Communication Matters and will continue to develop this for our mutual benefit. During the year, our administrator was pleased to be invited to attend a number of the Communication Matters' trustees' meetings.

#### Fundraising

As ever, we are very grateful to the organisations and individuals who raise and donate money to enable 1Voice to continue its activities. During the year we received £1,750 from Jessie's Fund to enable us to fund a group of musicians to deliver workshops at the national weekend. We also benefitted from a donation of over £2,100 from Sainsbury's from their carrier bag fund and £1,162 from Cargill Plc – Sweeteners. Special mention to Danny and Reay for their spectacular athletic achievements. Danny raised over £400 by completing the York 10 mile event and Reay raised over £500 by completing the Victoria Park half marathon. One of our volunteers was involved in organising a fundraising event held by Newcastle Speech Society which raised almost £420. We were also very grateful to Nick Allen at Banbury Postiche Limited for organising a charity golf day, Leeds Jewish Welfare Board, the Orford War Memorial Short Mat Bowling, Tobii Dynavox, Blizzard Protection Systems and First Aid Cumbria, and the Phyllis Leigh Charitable Trust for their generous donations to 1 Voice. Our supporters also raised £410 by sharing the 1Voice Christmas message instead of sending Christmas Cards. In addition over £150 was raised at a Christmas bake sale. £565 was also raised in advance of the launch of the newest 1Voice East of England branch which was launched in January 2018. Fundraising remains a big challenge and will remain a high priority for trustees during the next fiscal year.

#### **Financial review**

The net expenditure for the year was £14,022, including net expenditure of £5,813 on unrestricted funds and net expenditure of £8.209 on restricted funds.

#### **Reserves policy**

The charity's free reserves, excluding fixed assets, at the year end were £10,514.

The trustees formulated a plan to maintain a reserve balance of £2,000. This will cover commitments over one year, should the charity cease to secure funding and operate.

Other funds are designated for specific purposes. The level of reserves and the purposes for which they are designated are set out in the notes to the accounts.

The level of reserves are reviewed from time to time to consider whether they remain appropriate.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees report and the financial statements in accordance with the applicable law and UK Accounting Standards.

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

## Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2018

## 1 Accounting policies

## **Basis of accounting**

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) and with the Charities Act 2011.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. There has been no change to the accounting policies since last year.

No changes have been made to the accounts for previous years.

## Going concern

The trustees are satisfied that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

## Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the charity becomes entitled to the resources, it is more likely than not that the trustees will receive the resources and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

## Grants and donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Where grants are related to performance and specific deliverables, they are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

## **Expenditure and liabilities**

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out the resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

## Taxation

As a charity the organisation benefits from rates relief and is generally exempt from income tax and capital gains tax but not from VAT. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the cost of those items to which it relates.

## Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £500 are capitalised and included at cost including any incidental expenses of acquisition. Gifted assets are shown at the value to the charity on receipt. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost on a straight line basis over their expected useful economic lives.

## Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the accounts.
